

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Frank Baum published *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz* on May 15, 1900, his 44th birthday. One of the first American children's books to become a literary classic, *The Wizard of Oz* has since been translated into many other forms and remains central not only to the American national consciousness, but in the global imagination. Baum's theme of exotic travels which lead back to one's home and one's belief in one's self, has been a popular source of stage and film adaptations. Baum was a collaborator on the first musical theater adaptation which opened in Chicago, then in New York in 1902. After several film adaptations, the 1939 film starring Judy Garland pioneered technicolor and remains one of the top films of all time. In 1975 Charlie Smalls and William F. Brown created *The Wiz*, an African American musical version of *The Wizard of Oz*. Following its great success on Broadway, *The Wiz* became a 1978 Qunicy Jones-produced Motown film starring Diana Ross, Michael Jackson and Richard Pryor, urbanizing Dorothy's tale and setting it in Harlem.

Now *The Wiz* has arrived in Oberlin. Our production takes a step away from the glamour and spectacle of the Broadway production while punctuating the way Baum's original themes echo the African American experience of a people torn from home into a new land; of a journey through terror and enslavement to freedom and a renewed sense of vision. A 1975 *New York Times* article entitled "Does *The Wiz* Say Something Extra to Blacks?" points out that "*The Wiz* is full of symbols and associations, obvious and obscure, that relate to crucial aspects of the black experience and culture. The main themes running through the show are slavery and emancipation, the black church and religion, the great black migration from rural south to urban north." The idea of freeing the mind and spirit from the chains of physical and metaphysical slavery while "believing in the magic that's inside our hearts" seems particularly relevant at this moment in history.

Our storytelling-style ensemble production also draws inspiration from traditional African culture. Each of the witches in Oz and Dorothy's companions draw characteristics from traditional Yoruba deities, while the animal munchkin spirit guides recall the shamanistic traditions of the Dagara tribe of West Central Africa. Chris Flaharty's costumes, Damen Mroczek's set design, and Jen Groseth's light design all draw from elements of African and African American culture. Choreographer Adenike Sharpley and Music Director Courtney-Savali Andrews with conductor Michael Preacely have adapted the music and dance with these connections in mind. We also welcome back alum Matt Hill on African percussion with other guest musicians. The student performers are some of Oberlin's most talented.
